Statement of Intent

The purpose of the Pupil Development Grant is to improve the educational attainment and achievements of pupils who are entitled to free school meals (eFSM). WG Definition 2018 - The PDG should be used to support the needs of all children who are or have been eFSM in the previous two years or are looked after. The PDG is intended to provide support to disadvantaged learners to overcome the additional barriers that prevent those from disadvantaged backgrounds achieving their full potential.'

Improve pupils' fluency and accuracy in maths recall	The concept of automaticity is critical for the general success of students in mathematics. There are studies that have found math fact automaticity to be a predictor of performance on general mathematics tests (Stickney et al., 2012). Not only does automaticity help with general math, information-processing theory supports the view that automaticity in math facts is fundamental to success in many areas of higher mathematics (Woodward, 2006). Provide extra curricular activities to support the pupil to develop talents and strengths	Yet our research shows too many young people from disadvantaged backgrounds never get the chance.
